Researching Lea Cooper

Dear BMCAC

I hope this finds you and your community well and in high spirits at this time.

I am writing to inquire as to whether you have records about my mother, Lea Cooper and any documentation or information that you may have about the history of china painting and local women artists in the Blue Mountains prior to 1997. I am contacting your organisation, as mum was deeply involved in the Springwood arts community, and additionally, Jan at BMACHO, directed me to connect with you.

My mother was an artist and art teacher (adults) in the Blue Mountains from the 1960s until her death in 1996. She was based in Springwood and painted porcelain miniatures (portraits), china plates, cups and tiles, as well as multi-sized watercolor nature scenes. My mother died before the internet became widely used, and I cannot find any online record of her works. I am trying to trace her legacy and in doing so, also map the history of local women artists in the Blue Mountains. Thus far, it is my understanding that this history has not been well-documented.

Currently, I do not live in the Blue Mountains and am unable to visit actual libraries/galleries locations. Predominantly, mum signed her paintings with the surname 'Cooper', however, she remarried twice, and may have also used the surnames 'Luksic' and 'Sanford,' or none at all. Her first name was always signed 'Lea', however in her day-to-day dealings, she spelled it 'Lee'.

My brother was Brendan Cooper (now deceased), he worked at the Gazette for some time. Mum taught from our home in Charles St, Springwood, at the old arts centre on the corner of the highway, and in Katoomba and Sydney. She exhibited in many art shows including Braemar but unfortunately, I was too young to know the names of other galleries. Adding these details in case it is relevant for record searches or help jog the memory!

Any information would be greatly appreciated.

POTTERY FACILITATOR'S REPORT Bronwyn Campbell

The Monday group met for the first time this week. We had 3 members including a new member Joe Chipperfield. A very big welcome to Jo. Other members will join us over the next few weeks. I think our Monday night group will have very healthy numbers as we move forward.

I remind the Monday night potters to try and text me the Sunday before if they wish to attend the Monday session and to let me know if they wish to throw or to hand build on the night. Our room is small and even though we have reduced the number permitted to attend to 7, we may need to bring in an extra table to accommodate everyone, depending on the number who want to throw or hand build. Saturday potters please contact Michael Dausmann on the 'saturdaypotters' Facebook page.

As discussed previously, we had agreed for the Nepean Pottery Society to use our facilities on a Tuesday morning from 9am -1pm, while their premises at St Marys got refurbished later in the year. At present they are not allowed by the council to return to their rooms, so we decided to make our room available earlier than at first thought. On Tuesday Marianne Pollpeter and I enjoyed a quite morning and 2 further NPS members will attend next week. Half the NPS members are already members of our society, those who aren't will pay a half year membership. We are very happy to accommodate them at our Centre.

Over the last few days Alison and I have been working to create a Covid-safe room. Appropriate warning signs hand sanitiser and disinfectant have been put in the room. The room has also been rearranged to make movement around the room a little easier. After thinking our neon wall lights were broken for many years, Alison has fixed them. The switch is on the wall in the back-right hand corner. YAY for girl power. I have taken down a lot of old tatty signs and tidied up the notice board. A number of pottery hints had been pinned to the notice board for many years that are now old and dirty, so I have taken them all down and will retype and make them in to a little booklet that I will leave in a plastic sleeve in the room for all to peruse. If you would like a copy I can print it out for you for a very small cost.

Alison and I have also sorted and rearranged the moulds on the dollies. The dollies are very, very easy to pull out for easy access to the moulds. Please put the moulds back on the same dolly you got them from as there is logic to where they have been placed.

If you have borrowed one of our moulds could you please return it. One in particular, shaped like a coolamon is much used and we would like it returned ASAP.

Because of the extra pressure on or shelf space, I would ask everyone to please check for their work. The shelves are for wet, drying or ready to be decorated pots. If it is decorated and dry please put it in the kiln room. Do not leave any other equipment or clay on the shelves.

Please note the glazes and underglazes on the silver shelves belong to the adult Wednesday class and are NOT FOR GENERAL USE.

Richard's Musings

Modern art versus Academicism.

Every art school has a clear choice how it wishes to teach, by guiding students towards 'personal expression' or by concentrating on a 'technique first' attitude, with rules laid down by academism like the standards that were set at the French 'Académie des Beaux-Arts'.

Such rules are based on the premise that nature can be realistically depicted on a flat surface although there is no real depth, volume or movement. They go against Aristotle's adage that "Art does not imitate nature in its outward appearances but in its method of operation". And, what is nature's method of operation but generosity, changeableness, excitement, exquisite colours, specificity, drama, waste, even humour, for example by giving a monkey a blue arse. But perceptions and impressions all have to come through the artist's psyche by being personally involved.

Modern art flies the flag of freedom and schools like the Bauhaus in Germany set this forth in all its glory. Paul Klee was one of the major teachers there. Of course, the Nazis immediately disbanded it, rejecting these 'criminal' paintings, and ostracizing the artists that made them. Indeed, prevailing sympathies with the fascist ideology in France may have been instrumental for modern art not being taken up by the next generation after Picasso, Matisse, Rouault, Arp, Klee and other modernists.

The 'technique first' attitude is still alive and well and the battle is still being waged. At tech in the 1960's I personally had to decide on my position and I'm afraid, you too have to do so, today!

But in this current, profoundly serious crisis of a pandemic and of climate change, searching for a personal artistic expression it isn't enough anymore.

If we are to usher in a new world we cannot remain innocent bystanders when being confronted by climate change deniers and advocates of other ingrained ideas. We cannot afford to lean on old, comfortable, but false mental attitudes yet again.

In the long run our private, inner convictions need to align with what is crucially needed in the outer world and in our public life. The question is: can we learn from history this time round?

Kayo Yokoyama: My Story 13 June – 26 July 2020

In this exhibition Kayo Yokoyama explores her Japanese cultural heritage, focusing on aspects of Zen philosophy which played a significant part in her upbringing. Initially struggling with her Japanese heritage and strict cultural values Yokoyama moved to the US to embrace contemporary Western society before moving to Australia, where she started to reconnect with her cultural identity and Zen philosophy. Now based in Blackheath in the Blue Mountains, her work often results in physical manifestations of her search for a sense of home and belonging across the different countries and cultures she has lived in. Delicately etched trees are a recoccurring motif which hint at the universal comfort of nature



even in unfamiliar places. The moon and waterfalls are recent additions to her artistic language representing nature's beauty and companionship. Yokoyama's new body of work will explore Japanese aesthetics and echo ideas of Zen philosophy.
